# "Looking Back & Looking Ahead" from the intentional interim minister, Rev. James K. Boodley

As of December, I will have spent a year with you as your intentional interim minister. During that time, I've marveled at your energy, enthusiasm, earnestness, and sense of community. New efforts such as the visitation committee, youth group, and the still-in-the-works emergency aid committee have begun to take root and grow. And while attending a recent workshop on helping congregations through times of transition, it became clear that HUCC is growing from a pastoral church (one in which the pastor takes the lead on the majority of church activities) to a program church in which members of the congregation move ahead with programming on their own initiative. The latter provides room for individuals and groups to explore and develop their own passions and interests, which provide a sense of new possibilities for the entire congregation.

With the presidential election behind us, I've also received some helpful feedback about my sharing my own political points of view, as well-intentioned as those remarks may have felt at the time. As an interim, my first priority is to assist you in your transition toward a permanent pastor. That will continue to be the case.

As a minister, however, my ongoing responsibility will be to do my best to wonder with you, "What would Jesus have to say about this?" whatever "this" might be at the time. Add in a healthy dose of the Holy Spirit and the next question becomes, "What's our response to this?" That's a much more challenging question to answer, but an important one nonetheless. Wrestling with both of those questions *will* feel political; that can't be helped. Our lives take place in the political environment of the moment. At the same time, I hope our working through those questions together will help provide moments of clarity in what promises to be a thought-provoking future.

At the beginning of our time together I said, "If I haven't ticked you off by the time our work is through, then I haven't done my job properly." People always smile when I say that but are less than happy when it happens. That's understandable. Likewise, one of the best compliments I heard at the end of one of my interims was, "We didn't always agree with you, but you always made us think." I'll be mindful about annoying you needlessly, which isn't the same as avoiding controversy at all costs. I will, however, always attempt to make you think even – and especially – when there's the possibility we may disagree.

With that in mind, here are two new questions to get you thinking: "What do you want in the way of permanent pastoral leadership when it comes to talking about current events?" Whatever your answer, you'll need to let your pastoral candidates know your thoughts so s/he can make an informed decision about working with you. The more challenging question, though, is, "What does God hope of us when it comes to responding to current events?" I don't know the mind of God, but I'm trusting in the Holy Spirit to keep encouraging us to wrestle with that question on a daily basis.

Finally, I'll share the observation that HUCC is a tight-knit faith community that, in many ways, rises above the divisiveness of politics. That's no small accomplishment when considering the diversity of the people coming through the church doors each Sunday and during the week. Being an example of a genuinely loving group which welcomes growth as individuals and as a congregation will continue to make HUCC a fulfilling place to be for members, visitors, and in time, a new pastor.

Good job, people. I look forward to continuing the journey with you.


### Safe Church Policy

### **Bell Choir**

After our performance in the Christmas Concert, there will be no rehearsal on December 13<sup>th</sup>. Rehearsals will resume on December 20<sup>th</sup>.



Hear "The tintinnabulation that so musically swells from the bells, bells, bells." Edgar Allan Poe.

How many of you remember when Honeoye UCC did not have a bell choir? I'm sure the old timers (no names mentioned I do, but to many of you, the bell choir has always been an integral part of the church.)

In 1986, Wilma Zollweg-who now lives in Tennessee-suggested the possibility of a Bell Choir. There was definite interest in the idea. Arrangements were made to borrow a set from the church of the Master in Rochester. This worked so well that a bell committee was formed and immediately went to work.

From Clerk's minutes, "The experience with the borrowed hand bells was very successful. There is a definite interest in adding hand bells to our musical program."

At the semi-annual meeting in June 1986, Dick De Nise presented the findings of the bell committee. They proposed that the church purchase a Schulmerich Hand bell package of three octaves, cost \$4,524 plus \$100 shipping charges. The 37 bells are of good quality and guaranteed for life. The package included a portable bell table, carrying case and other accessories. In the discussion that followed, it was brought out that money could be used from the Memorial Fund if not enough was raised from donations. In the course of the discussion, Ginny DeNise remarked that, "Money is a tool. It can be used in many ways. Some churches with endowments but no people are closing." (I'm sure I "rambled" that quotation before but I like it!)

Grace Jackson moved that we purchase the prepared package and it was carried that the music committee be empowered to purchase the package with the approval of Council and trustees with a \$900 down payment. (Clerk's note: "In all my years of recording church minutes I have never recorded one received with more enthusiasm. The bells are certainly ringing.")

After the bells were purchased the church gave \$100 to the Church of the Master for so graciously letting us use theirs.

By 1987 we had two choirs; one directed by Wilma and the other by Ruth Roberts.

By November 1986 we had paid \$3,732.88. Choirs were practicing on Wednesdays in the morning and evening.

In April 1988 the Bell Choir request for money to buy more robes was turned down and DROPPED from the table.

In 1990 there were three choirs-Twinkle Bells, Youth Bells and Evening Bells. The Twinkle Bells had eight children grades 4 and 5 and the Youth Bells had 11 members grades 6 and 9.

The Adult Choir played at the Cuba Fest with 13 other bell choirs and played at a statewide Eastern state function in Rushville-among other functions. The youth played a t the Thanksgiving Ecumenical service and both the youth and Twinkle group played at school assemblies. Also in 1990 an additional three octaves were purchased.

It was reported in the Annual Report in 1992 that "Wilma Zollweg is a very able director for three bell choirs-an adult group that plays very well in competitions, a sixth grade quartet and a children's group."

In 1993 Wilma resigned as Bell Director because she was leaving the area. "Our utmost thanks goes to Wilma for the devotion she gave the Bell Choirs. She will be remembered for bringing to Honeoye the beautiful music of the bells."

Some additional thoughts about Wilma. Besides the groups mentioned she played many solos-had short term groups as well as an all men's group; helped Mary Bush with solos and took the choirs to perform on other occasions not already mentioned.

I think this is a good time to insert a personal note. I was in the Morning Group. We played several familiar Christmas carols at a meeting for the Women's Fellowship. As we were starting one song Wilma looked at me and mouthed, "Jane, are you on the right song?" My answer: "of course!" At the end of the song I whispered to Patti Ruppert playing next to me, "isn't this the song we play twice?" Patti's answer, "no Jane-that was two songs ago." The surprising part is that I came out with the rest of them. I don't know how many ladies heard those discordant notes. Poor Wilma! Do you understand why I never advanced to the Evening Group?

After Wilma's resignation Nancy Pease took over as Director and Ginny DeNise the administrator.

In 1997 Grace Jackson "took over"-Nancy still directing.

In 1998 the Evening Bells played for church, special services, nursing homes and Sr. Citizen group. Ginny DeNise also acted as Choir Director during this period.

This brings us to 2000 and a good time to rest! Look forward to hearing more about "our bells" next month!!!!
