meet **the** Pastoral Candidate

We shared a few details about Rev. Ken McIntosh in our Sunday announcement of "Candidate Sunday," but thought it might be helpful to add to that as part of the June newsletter. Ken has a diverse ministerial background and has been the Senior Pastor at First Congregational Church of Flagstaff UCC for the past five years. Besides preaching to his UCC congregation each Sunday for morning worship, Ken conducts a Sunday *evening* service on the campus of University of Arizona (Flagstaff) in his capacity as Lutheran Campus Minister.

Though based in Flagstaff for the past twelve years, Ken was Senior Pastor to First Christian Church in Binghamton. Besides traditional ministry, Ken has for many years taught Comparative Religion at Community College and has written a number of Young Adult titles for library publishers.

Ken's most recent publication – Water from an Ancient Well – Celtic Spirituality for Modern Life – is a very accessible invitation for us to consider ancient Christian traditions in ways that broaden our perspective of how Christianity can embrace the entire world. Many of the Pastoral Search Committee have read and appreciated how Ken's book and teaching background can enrich our own congregation's adult education program.

Ken's wife, Marsha has a teaching background and has also collaborated on research supporting a number of Young Adult Titles and even visited western NY to research the Iroquois / Haudenosaunee as part of a series on native people of North America. The child of missionary parents, Marsha was born in the Philippines and spent a number of her high school years in Peru. Ken and Marsha have two adult children – a daughter in Binghamton and son in Chicago.

At the end of my time working as a sabbatical fill-in at my first congregation, I told the group they were one of the best with which I'd ever worked and predicted a wonderful future for them. When their permanent pastor returned from her sabbatical, she told me that all hell broke loose after I left, with fights among the members which went on for months afterward. The pastor asked her members why they didn't fight while I was there. They replied, "J.K. thought we were perfect and we didn't want to ruin his opinion of us."

Since then, I don't tell congregations how wonderful or ideal I think they might be. "In need of improvement" is my standard assessment of all of the congregations with which I've worked, including the United Church of Christ of Honeoye. Will your new minister enjoy working with you? Absolutely. Will he find you to be a high-energy group in which the members enjoy their time together, keep an eye out for each other, and seems to hold a special place in the heart of the community? Most definitely. The image of "herding balloons" still applies in my mind.


At the beginning of my time with you, I also used the imagery of a plant which had become "pot-bound," with roots circling the inside of the pot, having run out of space to grow. The only effective way to get the plant growing again is to remove it from its (confining) pot, break apart the roots, then put in a larger pot with new soil in which to grow. After over a year with you, I've come to realization that at most, I've shaken the pot a little, loosened up the soil a bit. You've really only just started your transition away from life with Rev. Krause, even with the work we've done since Brian retired. To quote Winston Churchill, "Now this is not the end. It is not even the beginning of the end. But it is, perhaps, the end of the beginning."

In listening to Jeff and Mike talk about their experiences of Rev. McIntosh during the announcements this past Sunday, I thought, "Their new minister-to-be sounds 'different.' I wonder how the congregation will react to 'different.'" There will, of course, be the settling-in phase, with lots of cooing and clucking as the pastor and his wife get to know the congregation and community while the congregation and community get to know them. The busyness of the new school year and then the holiday season will soon follow. You'll have a bit of a breather after the beginning of the year but Lent, Easter and Pentecost will follow quickly. Throughout that time, though, your new minister will share with you a fresh perspective - and new ways of doing the work of the church. And they will be different than what you experienced with Brian and with me.

My question for you: "Will you embrace 'different' and see it as an opportunity for genuine growth?"

In July and August, I'll share some thoughts about what "genuine growth" requires vs. maintaining the status quo and thinking that water, sunshine and perhaps a little Miracle Gro are all that are required for a pot-bound plant to thrive.

Here's a preview: They're not.

Are you ready for more of the 1970 Parsonage Renovation story? Here goescontinued from July, 1970.

Last time I told you we had six propositions to be voted on: #1, Minister rents a home; #2, Minister owns a home (both with church support); #3, Minimum remodeling; #4, Greater remodeling; #5, build a new parsonage; and #6, buy a different parsonage.

Motion was made and withdrawn that we <u>keep</u> the parsonage. Those for "keeping" had plan-A minimum at \$12,000. Plan B average at \$13,200 or plan C maximum at \$17,300. Those for "selling" also had three parts-buy, build or invest.

Tom Reitz moved that we keep the parsonage. Thelma Huff seconded with the suggestion we mark our ballots, "keep" or "sale." The ballots were 29 keep; 6 sell, 1 blank. Motion approved!! Earl then suggested that a realistic vote should be between Plan A (\$12,100) or Plan C (\$17,300).

Marian McClintock (also a forceful personality) moved that we set an upper limit in expenses of \$8,000-discussion followed should we set a limit on just the amount or also designate how it should be spent. In his second of Marian's motion Dr. Harrison Ward noted that the church was poor because we had spent all of our money on the education wing. There was more discussion but the result was yes, 6 vs. no, 31. Motion lost.

This time around Fred Tinker moved we vote the three plans again. Earl reassured everyone that whichever plan was chosen-if it ran way over budget-the trustees would come back to the congregation for instructions. Ballot this time was Plan A-13; Plan B-6; Plan C-17; and Blank-1.

The ballot was spread again for Plan A or Plan C. Results: Plan A-13; Plan C-24. Finally-"success"! Moderator Bob thanked everyone for cooperating in a democratic procedure. We left the meeting re-assured that Mr. Hamlin (bank president) would be reasonable; the architect will be brought in to talk to the trustees, plans could be ready in a month; and the congregation would be kept informed.

At the September 1970 Council Meeting it was reported that bids are ready to put out to private contractors; the outside work should be done by November; the inside work within a month. By the November meeting the contract had been awarded to the lowest bidder-Glersky, from Honeoye Falls, for \$23,000. (Local contactors Durkee and Graham were not interested in bidding.)

Some changes had been made to the original plans-fancy bay window and patio plans modified; cellar and garage floors will be fixed later-resulting contract \$18,500.

By January 1971 the report was that the parsonage should be essentially completed by February 1st; the plumbing and kitchen cabinets are nearly done. The trustees are pleased with the way the work is being done; the builders had done some things as-lowering the ceilings to eight feet-better than the contract called for; copper plumbing is now installed throughout the house.

Forward to June 1971-Howard Barnard, trustee chairman-reported the "\$18,500 cost for fixing the parsonage was not sufficient. Some of the changes were to lay carpet throughout the house; pour the concrete in the garage breezeway, patio and sidewalk; storm windows and doors and change main electric panel (the architect had donated \$200 towards the carpets.)

(I remember washing the windows in the French doors that led into the enclosed porch from the dining room when we were expecting the Grahams. What a chore that was.)

In response to "why is all this necessary?"

Earl mentioned several reasons for keeping the parsonage-a minister would not have to decide where (continued on page 8) *(continued from page 7)* to live, which could be tricky in a small town; it is a nice location; close to the church; looks nice from the outside; land in back available for other use.

Guthrie Stone felt it better to rent a house in Honeoye. Don West said no places are available-people are asking all the time (Don worked at Rowley Real Estate.)

Betty Sargeant noted that we need to be proud of where our minister lives. If a minister purchased a \$15,000-\$20,000 home, thing of the equity the rent allowance could provide.

Ginny Denise feels we must make the decision if we are capable of going into debt \$25,000 more (we were still paying the education wing.) Doris Stone felt complete room arrangement would be like buying a Cadillac on a Chevrolet budget.

Jeff Huff questioned what we would have in 2-3 years even if we put \$20,000 into it now. Actually it would probably run 25-75% over budget. Earl feels we have an obligation to the community. If we sell the house and it's allowed to run down, we are not fulfilling our obligations.

Jeff also noted it is no longer necessary for the minster to live within walking distance of the church.

Earl noted the minister is in a better physiological position if he does not have to decide where he will live.

Guthrie Stone told us to look at this from a business point of view-this is the time to invest not borrow money; a minister should have freedom of choice as to where he will live; a new house would have fewer heat and repair bills; with an office in the church one is no longer necessary at a parsonage; we can't know that a person who buys it won't fix it up.

With that I will end the 70's parsonage renovation-but-be warned-I still have a few thoughts about it!

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BOARD OF TRUSTEES


