"Serving God" from the interim, Rev. James K. Boodley

One would think that serving God would be the primary focus of a congregation. After all, we pray to God, sing about God, talk about God, think about God every Sunday. Even so, in almost every church I've ever encountered - and certainly in almost every church profile l've ever read - the conscious decision to serve God is far down the priority list. Much like the reading we looked at on June 26th (Luke 9:57-62) in which various people promised to follow Jesus after taking care of some other pressing business, most congregations have other priorities demanding their attention before they get around to serving God: fixing the leaking roof, raising money for a new sound system, starting up a "new and exciting" praise-music worship service in the effort to attract young people, etc.

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For even those congregations in which the bills are paid, the sound system is working, and young families are coming through the door, serving God still isn't the central focus of their work. That's not to say they aren't busy; their members are often extremely busy with meetings, planning for special events, preparing for Sundays worship services, working on the building or church grounds, etc. But are all of those activities and priorities about a congregation serving God – or taking care of its members? With rare exception, almost all of the effort a congregation devotes to serving the church is really about taking care of its members.

Point one: Serving the church isn't the same as serving God.

That will make folks some angry. (Remember: Don't take it out on Cydney. She's not clergy.) When you've devoted a great deal of time, talent, and treasure toward serving the church, that's an understandable reaction. And with "down time" for a summer usually being congregation, these next two months will be an excellent opportunity to focus on what it means to actually serve God. That way, we'll go into the fall with a renewed sense of commitment and the search committee will be able to include in the church profile (if they choose to do so), "We're committed to actually serving God, not just talking about it. Here's how ... " Those two sentences alone will make any pastoral candidate sit up and take notice.

Let's do a quick run-through of the Bible to see what kind of guidance it provides. The Gospel of Matthew is an instruction manual of sorts, with its author focused on providing lessons for the Jewish community of his time. As such, it offers, I believe, a good "insiders' guide" to Jesus' life and ministry.

The foundational idea for the Christian way of life to which we all aspire is found in Matthew 22:34-40 – A Pharisee asks Jesus which commandment is the greatest. Jesus replies, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all you heart, and with all your soul, and with all you mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." In other words, "This is your bottom line: Love God and love each other."

How to do that? What approach to take? Matthew 23:1-12 – Regard Jesus as our teacher and learn from him as humble students. And "humble" doesn't mean groveling, it means being open minded as in, "I don't have all of the answers, but I'm eager to learn for an extraordinary instructor."

Matthew 25:31-46 – the separation of the sheep and the goats – is a major source of insight about the kind of behavior and motivation for that behavior Jesus asks of us. He notes that those who are blessed by God are people who gave food to the hungry, water to the thirsty, welcome to a stranger, clothes to the naked, care to the sick, and companionship to the prisoner. And they did so not to "win points" with Jesus, but because they were motivated by a basic sense of love for "one of the least of these, who are members of my family." Note that there's nothing about discipleship or "saving souls for Jesus" here, just a sense that love shared with the least of one's neighbors is love shared with Jesus.

What approach to being students of Jesus should we avoid? Matthew 23:13-15 – Don't get so carried away with dictating to others what they should or shouldn't be doing that you block them from gaining a real understanding of how to genuinely love God and their neighbor. Matthew 7:21-23 is also instructive about how not to do ministry: "On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and many deeds of power in your name?' Then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; go away from me, you evil-doers.'"

Recognizing that there probably aren't too many at HUCC aspiring to prophesy, cast out demons, or do deeds of power in Jesus' name, what are some of the more practical - and acceptable - options available to us? Go back to Matthew 25, the sheep and goats story. Those who Jesus said were blessed were concerned about others out of love for them. There's our driving motivation; love. If [fill in blank with activity of choice] is done out of love of others, then it's one which could be considered service to God. But. However. And yet. The sheep in Jesus' end-times story didn't feed, water, welcome, clothe, care or visit "the least of these" out of a desire to win points with Jesus. In fact, they didn't even realize that what they were doing was even noticed by him: "When did we feed, water, welcome, clothe, care or visit you?"

Point two: If whatever we do as a congregation is motivated by love, then it's a service to God.

In other words, let's stop worrying about currying God's favor and start asking, "Is what we're doing now borne out of love for humanity? And how can we do more - not because we have to do so, but because we want to do so?" Of course, the easy-way-out is to self-justify: "We want to have good worship services so that anyone who walks through our doors will be uplifted by the experience. That's loving others, isn't it?" Yes, if that's actually our motivation for having a good worship experience. But what if it's too hot or my sermon goes on too long or you-know-who is going on about you-know-what. Again? Is our concern about whether the rest of the congregation is benefiting from the experience or about our own discomfort? If the latter, then we aren't acting out of love, but of impatience.

What are we doing that we feel passionately is of value to others? What do others in the community feel we're doing which is of importance to them? How are we reaching "the least of these" in society and what other ways might we do so? Those are all good questions to help answer the question, "How are we serving God?" Perhaps the better question is to ask, "How are we loving the world?"

Point three: If we answer that second question well, then the first question about serving God will take care of itself.

May God give us the wisdom to ask good questions and the desire to expect great answers of ourselves and of God.


