**News from the Visitation Committee** 

As an initiative by the Board of Deacons, a Visitation Committee was formed 5/15/16 with 10 volunteers; the group has now grown to 13! Our purpose is to bring a sense of God's love and presence to our members and friends who may no longer be able to be an active part of our church community. We want to bring them comfort and to let them know they have not been forgotten. Sometimes our visits are very short (as in the hospital) and a touch, a prayer and a smile are all we can offer. Sometimes visits are longer as we share stories, laughter, and joy. Sometimes we take them out for lunch or to a concert. In all cases, we listen to them and try to acknowledge their worth by our presence, time and concern. The visits vary widely, but in all cases the people we have seen so far have been very appreciative and welcoming to us. We have completed eight hospital visits and fourteen home visits. There is always a need for more volunteers and suggestions for folks who may need a visit.

### "There's No Schedule" from the interim, Rev. James K. Boodley

elsewhere in this month's newsletter, the search committee has made good use of the summer to work on the church profile, the document that will be made available to potential pastors considering employment here. Even when the progress being made on the profile is combined with worship service and newsletter updates from the search committee, there will be some people who will think the process is already taking too long.

From my perspective and that of Rev. Ryan Henderson, the search process here is well ahead of schedule compared to most searches. If the rule of thumb for an interim is one month of interim work for every year the previous pastor served a congregation, we're only ten months into what one would expect could be a 35 month process. So, then, why might the end of the first third of the process feel as if it's taking too long for some folks? All of the congregations with which I've worked have disliked the interim period, some much more so than others. It's uncomfortable because it's unsettling, which makes some people extremely anxious. The person who worries it's "taking too long" reminds me of the youngster in the back of the car whining, "Are we there yet?!" They're probably tired and a little cranky. They'll be okay.

Likewise, being "well ahead of schedule" may sound good in theory, but it can also have a downside. Think, "I took the turkey out of the oven well ahead of schedule so we'll be having dinner in five minutes instead of two hours from now." That sounds yummy. Who wants raw stuffing? Or, "The ship's captain decided to finish the cruise well ahead of schedule. We'll be returning to port three days early. No refunds on the unused days." That'll go over well with the passengers. Or, "The doctor wants to go on vacation around your due date, so you'll be coming in to deliver your baby well ahead of schedule this afternoon." Um, no. Some things shouldn't be rushed.

I'd suggest looking at the progress we've made as getting a head start on the process. Nevertheless, expect that the *entire* process will still take its own good time to finish, whatever that may be. Remember, God made the Israelites wander around the wilderness for 40 years before they finally entered the promised land. Why? To let a generation of complainers die-off before the group would be ready for the challenges ahead of them. God does what God does in God's own sweet time. Trying to rush God along probably isn't the best strategy.

Finally, drawing from my own experience of late, being without a pastor of 35 vears is not unlike becoming an orphan: An important source of insight and stability is no longer in your life. One would hope that a congregation wouldn't regard a pastor as a parent figure, but that's rarely the case. Ideally, a congregation would also recognize that God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit are the more appropriate sources of insight and stability for a church, but that's also rarely the case. After 35 years, you're only just now beginning to learn how to "do church" without Brian. That's a process that can't be rushed, either.

Overall, the search committee is doing great work. Don't rush them. And certainly don't rush God. Just as I found when learning to ride my Harley, you have to "log the miles" (ie., do actual riding on pavement) before you become comfortable – and even more miles before you become good.

The 2016-2017 session of Sunday school will start next month. The official kickoff party is September 18th and I can't wait!! This is going to be an awesome year. I have entitled this year THE MYSTERY OF HISTORY; GOD'S UNCHANGING LOVE.

We are hitting on two major ideas. First, we want to help our youth understand that the bible is one glorious story about God's relationship with humanity. We want to help them understand how each person from the bible, as well as each of them, is an important part of God's plan. Secondly, we want to show how God's story has unfolded over thousands and thousands of years and that God's love has never faltered. Times change, people change, struggles change, but God never changes. These themes are not quick lessons and that is why we are giving them a full year of our attention.

Our first theme of understanding how the bible fits together can be hard for children to grasp. Teaching individual lessons from each story is one thing, but revealing how God has so intricately woven each experience to the

next makes the journey even more extraordinary. We will reinforce this understanding with the use of timelines and maps, with pictures and charts and of course good old fashion story telling. We will follow the sequence of events as through scripture they unfold and then we will place those events on our community timeline. As the year progresses our time line will grow with weekly contributions from each class.

Grasping how God's love never waivers is our second theme. We will focus on how God's love, grace and mercy are ever present throughout each story and how each character is deeply affected by that unfailing love. We will then encourage each class to apply how God's love affects their own lives today.

There is much to experience this year, but in the end it will be the Holy Spirit that will move us. Even after all these years of teaching, I am always amazed how that happens. It is the presence of God and our commitment to always letting God lead our ministry that brings our plans and God's plans together in the end.
