RABBIT-PROOF FENCE

You are welcome to join our monthly "Dinner & a Movie" on Saturday evening, May 14th. Dinner is at 6:00pm in the church dining room. Please bring a prepared soup, salad, bread or a dessert to share. At 7:00pm we will move downstairs to our amphitheater room which has a big screen and surround sound to watch the movie. Of course, we will supply the popcorn! Afterwards, we will return to the dining room for dessert and discussion of the film.

This month's movie is Rabbit-Proof Fence. Western Australia, 1931. Government policy includes taking half-caste children from their Aboriginal mothers and sending them a thousand miles away to what amounts to indentured servitude, "to save them from themselves." Molly, Daisy, and Grace (two sisters and a cousin who are 14, 10, and 8) arrive at their Gulag and promptly escape, under Molly's lead. For days they walk north, following a fence that keeps rabbits from settlements, eluding a native tracker and the regional constabulary. Their pursuers take orders from the government's "chief protector of Aborigines," A.O. Neville, blinded by Anglo-Christian certainty, evolutionary world view and conventional wisdom. Can the girls survive?

The next "Dinner & a Movie" is Saturday, June 4th. The films selected can range from current to classic and deal with all sorts of issues, and some are just for fun. "Pop Quiz"

For the past four ľve been mentoring first-time

honeybee keepers in the Finger Lakes Beekeepers Club. One of my advisees is a retired teacher. On a whim, I sent him a pop quiz after one of our visits together. "Pop quiz?! Recipes...do you have Recipes...

I LOVE to cook, and have a million recipes...how about you? Would you like to share your recipes with me and others from the church and community? How about if we share recipes AND make some money for our church? How about a cookbook fundraiser? Let's get this party started...

I understand that our church had a cookbook fundraiser about 15 years ago? Do any of you still have your cookbook? (I wish I had one...). 15 years ago it was quite the project as each recipe was probably submitted handwritten, and had to be retyped and formatted. With our new technology, we can still submit handwritten recipes (and scan them for publication), plus we can submit them electronically by email,

or even enter them directly into the cookbook software and it will be automatically formatted for printing. So the year long project of 15 years ago can be substantially reduced to just a few months. Here is the timeline.

Timeline:

Collect recipes – May thru June 30th (collect hand written or printed recipes, email recipes to me, if you is so inclined – you may enter the recipe directly into the cookbook website, contact me for details)

Enter recipes using software - May thru June 30th

Review and proofread cookbook - July

Print cookbook and take orders – September (*cookbooks to be available for the UCC Annual Fall Sale in October (aka Rummage Sale)* and Christmas gift giving)

Size: ~150 recipes (our goal is 150 recipes, 200 would be maximum)

For Sale: Make available to purchase at church, (*at our Annual Sale(s) and after*), also add a spot on our church website (*include PayPal for purchase*), and also sell at local stores/shops.

For the first step – let's start gathering recipes. You can email them to me (Annie – <u>Anneeski@gmail.com</u>) either type them in the e-mail, or attach a word document, or a scanned image if you have a handwritten recipe. (If it's a handwritten recipe, please be sure it's readable for someone to retype). You can also drop off hard copy recipes in the mail bins in the hallway near Cydney's office (named "Annie Bacon – Cookbook"). Or if you see me, just hand it to me.

In the coming few weeks, you will be receiving more details in an email blast, and I will have a guideline sheet available with suggestions.

This month will be a really mixed up "hither and thither" column. Ready?

The menu for the first Madrigal Dinner was Roast Pork, roasted root vegetables, baked barley casserole, red cabbage and apples, Irish-soda bread and the Flaming Pudding. Chief chefs were Jim Ruppert and Peter Nilsson of course the inspiration and overall chairperson was Nancy Pease.

Year? In the mid 1990's.

In 1997 there was considerable discussion about the children using the sanctuary for a play area after Sunday School and how to impress upon them that the Sanctuary and Music Room were off limits. It was suggested that this would be a good topic for a children's sermon because the <u>parents</u> would be listening. It was also suggested that the Library could be a place to play. How many of you were children then? What do the children do now?

In 1964, Ed Bacon, who ran a grocery store on East Lake Road, donated the ham for the Annual Church Fair Dinner. (Needless to say-we were happy to serve ham instead of Roast Beef that year!)

In 2001 renovation of the Church Sanctuary began. Mark Andrews, Don Jones, Jan and Neil Petty, John Trowbridge, Peter Badger, Gary Meek (and probably others) removed the tapestry from the walls; and put up and painted wallboard. Now that to me was a renovation project!

About this same time Mark Andrews was THE sound system monitor. Charlie Johnstone has been the capable, dedicated sound man since then. We are so lucky that there are several others who know what they are doing. The "team" today is Bob Bacon; Bill Badger; Artie Dietschler; Charlie Johnstone; Fred Jordan and Peter Nilsson. We are fortunate to have the system in capable hands. (I know that <u>I</u> appreciate them!)

In 1952 the Council voted to buy a mimeograph. For those of you who don't know, a mimeograph is the great-great-grandmother of the computer-but not nearly as tempermental.

In 1985 the sign in front of the church read:

"United Church of Christ (First Congregational Church) Honeoye, NY."

Regular trips to Salem Soup Kitchen in Rochester were a project in 1986. Have we been going continuously since then? When I started volunteering there Margaret White's aunt was the Pastor in charge. She is a pastor at the South Livonia UCC now-and plans to retire next year.

In 1975 the Church contributed \$25 to the fund for the Redwood planters for the Bi-centennial Project. Do you think we are using the same ones?

In 1978 Peter Nilsson was elected Moderator of the State Executive Committee. (You owe me, Peter, for mentioning you two times! I'll take an ice cream cone next summer.)

In 1991 Jan Burgwardt organized a Food Pantry cupboard in the old Church Kitchen. How that project has grown. "Early" thank you to Joyce Janowski and Lindy Bruce; "Later" thank you's to Renee and Tom Thornton and continued thank you's to Don and Laurie who are "the" ones now. Food Pantry is a wonderful service to the Town and we are blessed to have such good leaders and volunteers. (this is a little secret-there is a drawer in the old kitchen that has candy bars to lure the volunteers!)

We were enjoying yummy Chicken Corn Soup Suppers in the 1970's. Alverta May (Carol Ann's mother-in-law) always added the final touch-dropping in the "squiggles."

In 1976-and many times since then-there was concern over the electric bill. All groups were reminded to TURN OFF the lights when they left the building. Still good advice but this older person thinks we could afford more lights in the parking lot! (Did you read this, Trustees?!)

And-a final note-in April 1984 we were planning a Pictorial Directory; when I looked through the pictures members of 18 families are coming on a regular basis and several more part time.

With that, I will leave you-until.....

Pastoral Search Team - Kickoff Meeting Minutes - 4 March 2016

Following prayer, each member of the team shared their perspective - how they see our congregation as well as hopes / concerns about the search process.

Ryan reviewed his experience and discussed the typical steps that a Pastoral Search team must undertake. He left the team with two overview handouts:

1. Flow of events

2. Marks of faithful & effective UCC ministers

Ryan emphasized that many roles will need to be filled during this process, but asked us to select several initial positions to get the process underway and the team agreed to the following:

Secretary (Kelly Roller) - write updates, maintain notes of significant decisions, editor of church profile

Chaplain (Beth Stowe) - maintain the spiritual center of search, lead prayers

Co-Chairs (Mike Baker, Jeff Brown) - primary point of contact with UCC staff (Association, interim pastor), facilitate meetings, encourage discussion, ensure consensus decision making, report regularly to the congregation

We discussed three primary tasks to undertake immediately:

- 1. Develop a congregational survey as input to the church profile
- 2. Develop church profile
- 3. Congregational communication

Maintain a "status" bulletin board in the hallway opposite library and provide regular updates during Sunday worship.

We scheduled our next meeting for Monday 25 April @ 7:00 PM
