Jesus liked parables. One of the most familiar was that of a sower planting seeds: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds feel on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched' and since they had no root, they

withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!" (Matthew 13:3b-9)

While the point of Jesus' story wasn't to talk about effective crop management, it's worth noting that the sower wasted much of the seed he was planting. He scattered it randomly, some on the path he was walking, on rocky ground, among thorns, and only a portion landed on good soil. Nevertheless, Jesus didn't say the sower's efforts were pointless, that he should have stayed home and not bothered with his work. Losses came with the gains, but there were still losses.


An observation I've made in my own life: There's a field across from my house where I've watched two different farmers plant crops for 40 years. The first farmer would break up the soil each spring with a heavy-duty plow. Then he'd send his men out to remove the large field stones which had risen to the top of the soil, stones which would have damaged the farmer's planting equipment if left in place. When the first farmer retired and sold his property to a younger farmer, I noticed the new guy still broke ground the same way with deep plowing. He didn't, however, go out to remove the newly uncovered field stones. His tractors and plows were larger and heavier; the farmer plowed, planted, and harvested his crop by going straight through the newly surfaced rocks.

A fact of life for both farmers was that new field stones came up every spring. The stones rose out of a deep layer of sedimentary rock which took millions of years to form before that of the top soil currently in place. As a result, there's a nearly limitless supply of field stones waiting to come to the soil's surface. The farmers didn't arrive at the field each spring, throw up their hands in dismay because there were more stones, then go home. As long as the farmers were willing to do the work of tilling, planting, and harvesting, there would also be bountiful harvests to come out of the field.

The same is true in our own lives and the work Jesus asks us to do: There will *always* be challenges coming to the surface. There will always be difficult people, awful situations, racial tensions, political fights, and grossly unfair treatment of "the least of these" around the world. Those challenges are old and deep. Even so, we don't throw our hands up in dismay then go home to sulk or cry or give up in frustration. Instead, we join the Risen Christ in his ongoing work of clearing away this year's fresh field stones then join our brothers and sisters in Christ to care for God's creation.

After all, field stones are part of God's creation, too.

Anyway, we did have a great summer at the pantry and the good news is that pantry numbers are down a little due to some people finding jobs.

We are in full swing the Sunday School wing. We invite you to come and peak into our rooms. Ask a child to show you around and be sure to stop by our Bible Timeline that is hanging in the hall. We have already covered creation, Adam and Eve, Noah and Abraham and Jacob.

This month our lessons will consist of:

November 6th: Our younger classes will review our timeline and all they have learned up to this point. The rest of us will be joining in the Election Day dinner festivities by helping to set up the dining room. It is always a fun lesson on serving God and each other.

November 13th: We will be studying Moses up to the time he leads the Israelites out of Egypt. We will focus on how God's plan for Moses started when he was a baby and developed over time. We will learn that God has special plans for us as seen in Jeremiah 29:11¹¹ I know what I have planned for you," says the Lord. "I have good plans for you. I don't plan to hurt you. I plan to give you hope and a good future.

November 20th: We will continue with Moses as he leads God's people through the wilderness. We will explore how God guided and cared for the Israelites. We will review how God provided nutrition for their bodies in the form of manna, quail and water. We will explore how God provided rules, in the form of the 10 Commandments, so they could learn to live and care for one another. Lastly, we will learn how God provided direction though the pillars of fire and the great tabernacle. We will come to understand how God still provides for us today.

November 27th: We will touch on Joshua and how he led the people into the promise land and conquered the city of Jericho. This is a perfect place to put our Time Line studies on hold until after Christmas. We still have more to explore in the Old Testament and will continue again after Christmas. In the weeks to come we will continue with Advent lessons and join together to prepare a special Christmas program that will be performed December 18.

Visit to the Abbey of the Genesee



It is interesting the bits of information you pick up when you are looking for church secretaries and janitors!

Here are a few purposely not in chronological order:

In 1937 the Annual Church Fair and Roast Beef Dinner was started as a joint effort between the IWBT Class and the Ladies Aid. Marjorie Reed, Edna Treble and Gloria Weider were the steering committee. The last church fair was in 2000. (We all outlive our usefulness!!)

Speaking of dinners, when you look at the clipping in the church dining room about an Election Day Dinner (west side of room) please be impressed that all of the aprons being worn came from Jane Barnard's kitchen. (She probably still has them all.) Marian Gessin chaired the dinner for 10 years. How long have you been doing it, Helen? I must add that when I first came to Honeoye-and for many years after that the president of the Ladies Aid was always Chairman. When Ladies Aid disbanded and probably a few years before that was no longer the case. Good change!!!!

In 1979 there was an ongoing discussion about a "quiet time" before church started. It was hoped that ringing the bell, starting the music and having the choir enter at 10:25 would be our signal to sit and contemplate. We are slow learners but that doesn't mean we don't appreciate your music, Nancy.

In 1961 we purchased a mimeograph for \$288. (Even I could use that!)

In 1987 when she was in kindergarten, Gwen Tschorke Rowley was the United Way Poster Child. What an inspiration Gwen and her family were (still) to all of us. (You're still a "cutie", Gwen!)

In 1902 the parsonage was built. We have had many discussions about its "survival" through the years. I think I am safe that it won't be disposed of in my lifetime! (Whew!)

In 1979 Rev. Asbrook, Rev. Frank Pennington and Nancy Pease were in charge of a Church Newsletter.

In 1951, a board of ushers consisting of 12 MEN was established. Don West was chairman. Are you sitting down?? In 1978 WOMEN were welcomed as ushers. We have had many women chairmen.

In 1957 lights were installed in the church steeple. Also that year Bill Koehnlein was responsible for the church signs at either end of the village.

In 2014, 104 names were removed to the inactive role. (It is very simple to get on the active role again-just "come on down" on a Sunday!) Also in 2014 we were "visited" by Frederick Douglass-the great emancipator-who raised many eyebrows by marrying a local daughter, Helen Pitts.

In 1988 Dorrie Polvino (Carol Ann May's mother) started putting out jars for "Pennies for People." The jars are still there on Sundays (thank you coffee hour people) but today it's "Pennies for Pantry." Our old kitchen area is the headquarters for this very deserving project. Thank you Don and Laurie and all of you helpers.

And—finally—at a 1973 Council meeting, many proposals were made to the Church Renovation Committee. They ranged from "do nothing" to "replace the building." Aren't we thankful that neither was accepted!
