Bell Choir, Children's Choir and the Adult Choir are all on summer hiatus! Thank you for a great year of making beautiful music!




# Vacation Bible School Sundays have begun!

#### To Sale or not to Sale? – That is the Question

For those who have volunteered for the Church Sale (whether it be rummage, tag, or treasure) over the last few years it will come as no surprise that traffic at the sale, revenue and the number of people who can commit to being fully active volunteers have all steadily decreased over time. In addition, the amount of "left-overs" has increased (including 45 boxes of clothing left over from the Spring Sale).

There are many other fund raising ideas to consider but all of them require volunteer coordinators, time, talent, passion and commitment.

Painting:

-Contractor will be starting the downstairs first and finish by end of July. This will allow the flooring contractor to begin.

-Finish painting upstairs rooms/floors no later than mid-August.

Flooring:

-Flooring contractor will start immediately after first floor painting is completed. Will include refinishing living room and installing the new flooring in the entry way and dining room.

Other Parsonage:

-Dishwasher ordered and will be installed by the end of July.

-Gutters cleaned and repaired.

-Deck cleaning will be done when all painting is finished.

-Big thanks to the Roller family for working on the gardens.
