

"One Day that Changed the World"

It's fascinating how an event that would appear tiny and ordinary at the time could create shockwaves that change the course of human history. On October 31st much of the world will focus on Halloween. But there's another event to remember this year on that date. 500 years ago, in the Eastern German city of Wittenberg, a young monk—not very impressive looking—took a hammer and nailed a long scroll of paper on the kiosk next to the city's church.

Nowadays, he would have sent a Tweet or made a Facebook post. It might have generated thousands of responses in a matter of hours. In the Middle Ages, word



took longer to get around. But, thanks to a new high-tech invention called the printing press, word did get around. And those words began the biggest revolution in the history of Christianity.

On October 31, 1517, Luther had no intention of splitting the church or creating a new brand of Christianity. He was a minor academic making some points regarding what he regarded as abuses in the church. The 95 theses would be forgotten today, except that the ideas therein led to a repudiation of the supreme authority of the church, and to a new formulation of the way that humans are reconciled with God. In turn, that led to a divorce between two halves of the great Christian family called the church.

This 500th anniversary of the Reformation will provide our congregation an opportunity to think through what it means to be Protestant. We can rejoice in the spiritual benefits that have come from the Reformation, but also mourn the losses incurred by the splintering of our faith into so many factions.

Perhaps the most important thing to remember is that when Luther brought new ways of thinking into the church 5 centuries ago, he didn't intend those to become crystalized in time. There's another reformation slogan, "Semper Reformanda" = "always reforming." It's much like what we say in the UCC, "God is still speaking." Let's be open to what God's Spirit is saying to us about the reforms needed among God's people today.

In 1862 there were four church organizations in Honeoye and it's vicinity. The oldest was the Center Congregational Church (across from Carol Ann May's on County Road 37); then the Honeoye Methodist Protestant church; the Second Advent Church and the Honeoye Congregational Church.

In 1863 nearly all of the center church united with the Honeoye Congregational Church. The Methodist church edifice burned-they dissolved and sold their land to pay their debts and came to Honeoye Congregational.

For many years residents in this area that were once connected to the Baptist Church-transferred from West Richmond to Hemlock Lake-worshipped in Honeoye. Many of the Second Advent Communion found it more practical to join in the privileges and duties of Honeoye.

Such a course of events and such results had not been customary. "These transitions have been as easily and quietly and naturally accomplished as spring passes into summer. Neither in consequence has any root of denominational bitterness, nor even any words of denominational controversy, at any time sprung up among us. While the associations and memories of earlier years have an honored place in our hearts and homes, we find neither difficulty or hardship in cordially and fraternally working and worshipping to cheerfully keep the unity of the Spirit in the ond of peace." (Good for them!)

One of the most important blending of those churches was the success of the Sunday school. There were 250-300 members and 25-30 teachers. This situation "can do more and better in a community than

if same membership were divided into three or four feeble schools and maybe rival interests. The fraternal feeling of the church and congregation has been a blessing to all.”

Enter S. Mills Day in March 1862.

Before I say anymore about “S. Mills” I think you will enjoy his father’s (rev. Warren Day) description of Honeoye in 1816.

“I commenced in the center when the Mills’ and the Miller’s house were erected at Honeoye.

Besides those there was a frame house which became part of a tavern, and a log house and a log blacksmith shop. The trade and business which now (1862) goes to that place then went to the Center where were two stores and as many mechanic shops and Drs. Cook and Ellis who were succeeded by Dr. Cheney. (Doesn’t that seem like a lot of doctors?) That large meeting house was generally well filled on the Sabbath.”

You may wonder why I am going into the S. Mills Day genealogy. This is it!

S. Mills was the first pastor of the newly combined church in Honeoye. (That is us!)

He was born August 8, 1827. He was married in 1852 to Lucy Maxwell of Otisco-near Auburn, NY; they had four children; he served in Honeoye from March 9, 1862 until he retired July 1, 1896 at age 69 (which was considered “elderly” then.) He was made Pastor Emeritus August 15, 1896. He died November 11, 1906.

His father was the Reverend Warren Day who served the Center church from 1816 to 1828 and again from 1845-1849. This church was built in 1815 and taken down in 1885.

Reverend Day’s career as Pastor was a notable success. His family lived in the parsonage at the center for a time and he held services at both churches. His career was marked by two prominent revivals-on both occasions many united with the church.

At one time, under his leadership, the Sunday school had the distinction of being the “banner Sunday school” of the county with a membership of 250-300. When he started as pastor in 1862 the membership was 16-at the close of his pastoral, 200.

“A gentleman of the old school was the Rev. S. Mills Day, teacher, diplomat, scholar; a graduate of Union College, Schenectady in 1850, valedictorian of his class; finishing his theological work at Auburn in 1852. At one time he conducted a private school in Honeoye; was instrumental in forming the Honeoye Union School (our present Honeoye Central) where he was President of the Board for many years.

“Outstanding was the beauty of the English housed in writing the proceedings of the forming of the church society and beautiful, impressive Ritual Articles of Faith and Covenant that were written by this talented man.”

Once again I am finding that I am becoming too long winded and will have to continue this next month. Then I will tell you why I got into this part of our church history.

To fill up my allotted space here is a quote from Rev. Day’s 20th Anniversary Sermon in Honeoye, 1882.

“Our present membership is 96. (1862 membership 16.) The enrolled membership of this church has always seemed to me to be much smaller than it was wise and dutiful than it should be considering the large number of non-enrolled Christian believers who have all along been interested and cordial partakers in the work and worship of this congregation. (Wow! That is telling it like it is-probably explains why the Sunday school was so big-everyone in town came since it was the only church in town then. I, personally, have some of the same feelings today-but in 2017 we have several active churches in our area.)

Ok-thank you-get rested for some more about “S. Mills!”






- **Sunday October 15** – after Sunday Worship lunch will be provided. Carefully planned inside and outside tasks will be available.


Helping Hands Saturday:

On the fourth Monday of every month, the Honeoye UCC has a commitment to serve a lunchtime meal at the Salem Nutrition Center in Rochester, NY. Started in 1984, the Salem Nutrition Center has been serving Rochester's hungry for more than 30 years. Over 19 churches are represented by volunteers, who help in preparing and serving the meal to provide from some of our city's most marginalized citizens.

In addition, Salem Nutrition Center also organizes and facilitates the distribution of clothing articles and bus tokens. Clothing is distributed on the fourth Monday of each month, and socks are always in high demand. The bus token program, often operated on insufficient funding for the wideness of its need, provides a way for people to make it to important appointments such as doctors visits and assistance programs. Proceeds from our spaghetti supper in January goes to benefit the bus token funding.

In the past, our church has shown a great support for this very important ministry in the number of volunteers willing to attend. Anyone and everyone is welcome, regardless of age. This month, we will meet on Monday, October 23rd at 9:00am in the church parking lot. We carpool together to Salem UCC, serve lunch, and return no later than 2:30pm. Please consider joining us. 


East Bloomfield Historical Society

Jeannette Klute: A Photographic Pioneer

The focus of Jeannette Klute's career at Eastman Kodak Company was on new discoveries in color photography, in particular, the Dye Transfer color process. Klute adopted the laborious Dye Transfer process in the interest of highlighting landscape and natural settings. She promoted environmental concerns in her views, joining a small group of landscape modernists including Elliot Porter, who chose the new aesthetics of advanced color technology over the conventional appearance of black and white nature settings. The release of this new title illuminates a particular period in twentieth-century American photography, accompanied by fine examples of Klute's work. Her photographs are held by a small number of American collections in the U.S., and the RIT Archive Collections at Rochester Institute of Technology contains the largest holding of her lifelong work.

An exhibition of Ms. Klute's work will be held at the RIT William Harris Gallery from October 5–28, 2017.
